In one of the Peanuts cartoons, Charlie Brown and Linus are talking together as they walk along a path.

In our Sunday School this year, we have had good teachers just like Miss Othmar. Great human beings and people of faith! And we honor them this May.

No task could be more important than working with our children and young people. We teach our children piano and math. We send them to baseball and lacrosse camp. But we also have to pass onto our children the importance of developing an inner life, the importance of

a personal relationship with God. Many of us would not be in church today were it not for the Sunday School teachers who influenced our faith and values as we were growing up.

I heard a story not long ago about a little girl, four years old, who went to Sunday School. Her parents picked her up, and on the way home from church, they said, “How was Sunday School?”

The little girl said, “It was wonderful! We had Jesus’ grandmother as our teacher!” The parents said, “Jesus’ grandmother was your teacher! What makes you think that?” And the little girl said, “Well, she talked about Jesus all the time and showed us his pictures. She must have been his grandmother.” That Sunday School teacher was communicating a powerful message of faith and love.

My – and the church’s – deep appreciation goes out to all those who help with our Sunday School children and young people. You are wonderful!

Sabbatical: My Intentional, Focused Time Apart

A few short weeks from now, I will begin the adventure of my sabbatical. Many of you have asked what a sabbatical is, and what I will be doing during this time; you have asked about my hopes and plans.

As approved by the Board of Deacons, I will be gone from May 19 to July 13, and the Rev. Peggy Allen will provide coverage, bringing her own special ministry among us once again. These eight weeks are half of the 17 weeks allotted for a sabbatical here at First Congregational, and with the Deacons' blessing, I will hold in reserve the remaining nine weeks for a later time.

“Sabbatical” is a word most often used in academic and church settings to refer to a time set apart from regular routines and responsibilities to focus on a project, fulfill a goal, or as an intentional time of study and rest. This church offers its full time staff this benefit and opportunity after six completed years of ministry.

Sabbatical finds its origin in the biblical concept of Sabbath, the practice that God commands us to observe in Exodus 20:8-11: “Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God.” For those driven by schedules and outside responsibilities, take this to heart: God commands all of us to stop and take a break! Days off, vacations, time apart –

they are all ways to observe what God is trying to tell us: rest and recreation are essential to our well being and are part of the rhythm of life.

Much more than an extended vacation, a sabbatical is meant to be an intentional and focused time to be recreated and refreshed, no matter what one does, but *what* one does is in response to the Holy Spirit's leading. You'll remember in recent years that Debbie Gravell's sabbatical included time apart to study the Workshop Rotation model of Church School, and Rick Dacey's sabbatical included time to work on his Doctor of Ministry degree program as well as the ministry exchange in Australia that brought Graeme and Jenny Gardiner to us.

Where is God leading me? I am prayerfully approaching my sabbatical as a time to rest, reflect, and renew. What I will be doing is this: some traveling, and some staying put here in town. I will use this time to reflect on my first six years of ministry here. I will do my best to get to that ever growing stack of books (okay, stacks) that I have wanted to read these past few years about exciting practices in ministry. But at the heart of it, I will use these eight weeks to place myself most fully into God's care that I might return refreshed and renewed to you: it's the best gift I can give you.

At the same time, I need also to share what I will not be doing: I will not be

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present in worship or attend any church functions. I will not be taking any phone calls or reading my email. I will do my best to make myself scarce. If we happen to see each other at the grocery store, I will smile and wave, but please know that it will be hard for me to not stop and talk. I'll need your help with this.

In worship on May 4, I will share a litany with you on this time apart and a way that we can remember and pray for each other during these eight weeks. My sermon that day will focus on the concept of sabbatical: seeing our sense of time from the lens of God's wider created order.

During my time away, I will pray for you and ask that you pray for me. In our separateness and in our togetherness, may we seek God's presence and purpose; may we be emboldened as ones sent by God to live the Gospel with our lives.

Work on By-laws Revision Nearly Complete

One of the unique and distinguishing characteristics of a Congregational Church is its ability to govern itself. We recognize no other ecclesiastical authority except Jesus Christ as the Head of our church; we have no Pope, no Bishops, no Council of Elders. Our denomination, the United Church of Christ, has no say in determining our internal set of rules. Our church's government is vested exclusively in us, the members of the First Congregational Church.

Our 'constitution' (for lack of a better word) is our by-laws. Any change to those by-laws must be approved by the membership.

A small and dedicated team consisting of Dennis Lape, Bill Gordon, Mark Sullivan, and June Webster have been diligently working with representatives from all church boards and committees to update our by-laws. Their work is nearing completion. The Executive Board has reviewed the recommended changes, and we are in agreement that now is the time to present these changes to the full congregation.

The by-laws changes can be grouped into three broad categories.

First, there has been a major effort to make the wording, format and style **consistent** throughout the 34-page document. Second, the by-laws have been **updated** to reflect the way we currently do business. For example, we recently

expanded the office of the Treasurer to include an Associate Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer. Similarly, we created a Safe Church Committee. Changing the by-laws to reflect these first two categories is necessary and important, but is mostly administrative in nature.

The third category is more substantive and **changes some of our basic polity**. Among the proposed changes is a revised definition of membership, an expansion and clarification of the role of the Endowment Committee, and the creation of a succession plan for church leadership. These issues require your thoughtful and prayerful consideration.

In accordance with our current by-laws, any change to the by-laws requires two congregational meetings. The first is to inform the membership of the nature of the changes. A second meeting is called to vote on the changes. These two meetings are scheduled for the first Sundays in May and in June. In addition, the by-laws team will hold informational meetings between services on selected Sundays during May to answer questions about the proposed changes.

Copies of the draft proposed by-laws will soon be available in print format in the church office. And for your convenience, as well as to save printing costs, an electronic version will be available via a link to the church's web site,

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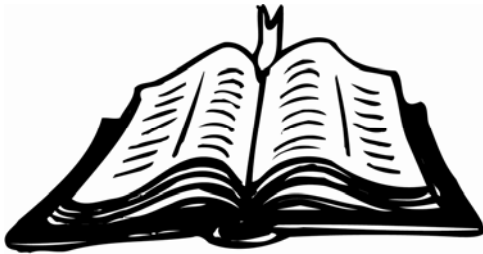

The proposed revision is the most comprehensive review and update of our governing directives in decades. This labor-intensive effort was undertaken for us, the church membership. We strongly encourage you to review these changes and to actively participate in the upcoming church meetings that will bring this effort to fruition.

Strawberry Festival Coming Next Month

First Congregational Church's annual Strawberry Festival will be held for the 71st time next month. It will take place on Saturday, June 14, from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on the Church Green.

In addition to hundreds of pounds of fresh strawberry shortcake and other food, this year's festival will feature free performances by local musical groups, including the Cheshire Community Band; the 102nd Army Band; and a jazz band from the Coast Guard. There will also be children's entertainment, pony rides, a petting zoo, and inflatable rides such as Moonbounce.

The Cheshire Historical Society's antiques and collectibles show will be held at the same time on the grounds of the Cheshire Historical Society next to the church. If there is rain, the event will move inside to the Parish Hall.

On May 4, in the Parish Hall, there will be an opportunity to sign up for Strawberry Festival volunteer positions.

Giving Back Our ‘First Fruits’

Why do we give?

Is it because someone has a need that we can satisfy? Or do we give because we are blessed, and it’s in our nature to express our feelings of gratitude and joy by giving back some of our plenty?

We are surrounded by need. Even in Connecticut, it’s all around us: homelessness, poverty, hunger, and social despair. As the economy degenerates, neediness increases. If we gave because there was need, wouldn’t we give more?

But when we bring food items to Communion service the first Sunday of every month, the number of food items doesn’t seem to rise and fall with the economy. When we’re picking out those food items, do we think about the level of need that our neighbors demonstrate? I suspect not.

We give, in most cases a portion, of what we purchase for ourselves. You might say it’s “of our substance,” part of what we need and are able to provide in abundance for ourselves with God’s blessing.

It’s part of an ancient tradition, well documented in the Old Testament, and was a part of living a religious life long before money was invented. It’s called First Fruits.

At the end of the growing season, after all the drama of plowing and sowing and cultivating and harvesting, of hoping for rain and fearing for wind and storm, of watchfulness for insect and animal and

human depredation, when the earth’s bounty was finally happening, what was the first thing to be done by the ancient Hebrews? A big feast? A party? A blow-out?

No. A thankful person, a devout believer, turns to God and returns in kind what has been granted.

Did that person earn it with his hard work? Yes, in a manner of speaking, but that’s not the whole truth, and there’s no thankfulness in putting it that way. There are a million ways the hard work could have failed without God’s favor and generosity.

The first act was to return the First Fruits as a gift to God. Yes, it fed the priests, or whoever needed it – but that’s not why the person gave it. It’s a testament of faith.

It’s no different now, whether it’s a few cans of beans, a few bills in the weekly envelope, or the annual pledge check. We give because the joy of the Lord’s bounty is upon us, and because our feelings tell us that there is no better way of saying so to God than making a return.

We don’t need to say this to anyone, but we need to recognize it ourselves and be clear about why we do it. It doesn’t have anything to do with a budget. It isn’t dues. It’s not focused on satisfying a need – the church’s, or anyone else’s. It is an exuberance of spirit.

Illogical, but generous and spiritual. And it floats God’s boat.

Parish Care – What Is It, and Who’s Doing It?

Parish Care is a ministry that grew out of our Envisioning Process in early 2000 when our church discerned a need to take a more active role in answering Christ’s call to reach out and provide loving care to those in need – specifically, to provide many small acts of kindness for members of our own congregation as well as those in our greater community.

Currently, our Parish Care ministry consists of a Parish Care Committee, a Parish Care Coordinator, clergy, and 10 individual ministries. Each of these components is summarized here:

The Parish Care Committee’s purpose is to provide oversight and direction of the 11 individual Parish Care ministries. This is a self-administered and self-sustaining group, operating under the auspices of the Board of Deacons. Jim Van Der Beek is the chairman of this committee.

The newly created **Parish Care Coordinator** provides a link between the efforts of the various parish care ministries, the clergy, and those with a new or on-going need. In addition, this individual performs a variety of administrative functions including the tracking services provided and care received. Donna Mead is the Parish Care Coordinator.

Our 11 caring ministries are lead by one or two members and carried out by very committed and talented volunteers.



Meals Ministry, organized by Nancy Linton and Lynn Ryan, provides simple meals to members who are ill or recently home from the hospital. There is also a Freezer Ministry that helps supply the Meals Ministry.

Rides Ministry furnishes transportation assistance, with advance notice, to and from church and medical appointments for those who do have their own means of transportation. This is organized by Beth and Kevin Ross.

Small Chores Ministry performs just that – small chores around the house that the occupants can not perform themselves due to infirmity or illness. This is organized by Charles Jones.

Caring Crafts Ministry, organized by Donna Mead, is a group that gathers monthly to knit prayer shawls and lap robes for members and friends of the church who are going through a difficult time. They literally wrap folks in love and prayer. They also knit baby blankets for the newborns of our congregation.

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Telephone Calls and Cards

Ministries are under the leadership of Martha Lape; they let those who are ill, bereaved, convalescing or celebrating a life milestone know that their church is praying for them.

Birth and Baptism Ministry visits the families of church members with newborn babies, bringing a baby blanket and child's Bible and is led by Pam and Ken Euerle.

Stephen Ministry trains and equips lay people to provide confidential, one-to-one Christian care to individuals in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties in their lives. This ministry is led by Sue Chatfield.

Caring Christians Ministry equips and trains members of our church to conduct monthly visits to individuals in our congregation who are homebound or in nursing facilities.

Prayer Pager Ministry is a unique way for members of the congregation to electronically notify someone in need that they are being prayed for. The congregation supports this ministry by faithfully dialing the phone numbers listed weekly in the bulletin, letting the receiver know someone has said a little prayer for him or her. Currently, six pagers may be lent to those in need.

The Bereavement Ministry, our newest ministry, is led by Jan Garthwait, and grew out of the recent bereavement small group. Jan visits with the newly bereaved and provides resources with a caring and listening heart.

Meet the Women Of the New Testament

The Women's Bible Study group is looking at "Women of the New Testament." The group meets weekly in the parlor. Participants use a study guide from the Life Guide Bible Study series. It costs \$5.

The group explores different scriptures and different women each



week, as members walk through this series. You are welcome to study with us when you can, and be away when you must. Each week stands by itself.

All women of the church are welcome. The sessions are led by Debbie Gravell.



Youth Ministry Search

The Director of Youth Ministry Search Committee continues its efforts to search for a Director, with some assistance from the Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ. The Associate Conference Minister for Youth and Young Adult Ministries, The Rev. Da Vita "Day" McCallister is providing support and guidance to the process.

With her wealth of experience and fresh perspective, the search is on a new path toward finding our next Director of Youth Ministries. More information to come ... stay tuned.

Church School Activities in May – and Later

Bible Journeys: On Sunday, May 4, all 11:00 children (PS3 through 6th grades) will be in church school, not in the worship service. Please plan to be in attendance to help children prepare for Children’s Sunday, May 18.

Children will prepare for Children’s Sunday using the “Believers, you’ve got mail – letters of apostle Paul” rotation. We need all children in our church school, especially our Bible Journeys children, to attend each week so we can prepare to be worship leaders.

The dress rehearsal for Children’s Sunday is Saturday, May 17. All children, teachers, shepherds and helpers are needed at the rehearsal. The 9:00 church school will rehearse from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., and the 11:00 church school will rehearse from 11:00 to noon.

More about Children’s Sunday: Our children in our church school will all participate as worship leaders. The theme will be letters of the apostle Paul. Other highlights:

The apostle Paul will visit our church service; children will read special letters from Paul; younger children will lead the call to worship and a prayer; Junior High students will lead the morning prayers, usher and greet. Also, children will lead a special greeting of the peace; there will be a special coffee hour; and displays in parish hall will show the special activities children did to learn about the apostle Paul.

This is an exciting culmination of our church school season. Please plan for your children to participate on children’s Sunday. If you have any questions or concerns, speak to Debbie Gravell.

Heifer Project: Preschool 3 through 1st grade selected as a class the animals to purchase for Heifer Project International: We will buy a flock of chicks, a flock of ducks, and a trio of rabbits. The students then raised the money with their families by using arks and calendars. We have received almost \$200 so far. Many thanks to the families.

On May 4, a 4-H group will bring their baby animals to teach about Heifer Project. Jillian Stronk, Susan Kostin, and their 4-H group will be in the back yard with their animals. Children in preschool 3 through 1st grade will visit during their class time.

Schedule for May 4: 9:15 to 9:40 preschool 3-2nd grades: Chapel service. 9:45 to 10:10 preschool 3-1st grades visit animals. 9:45 2nd graders go to Bible Journeys class. 10:10 preschool 3 through 1st grades will go to their classes. (No music on May 4.)

11:15 to 11:40 preschool 3 through 1st grades: Chapel service. 11:15 grades 2 through 6 Bible Journeys classes. 11:40 preschool 3 through 1st grades visit animals, then go to class. (No music on May 4.)

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Snack and Juice Supply: 3-year olds through 1st graders are served snacks and juice on Sunday mornings. Having parents contribute once a year helps us keep within our budget.

We welcome all contributions and offer a schedule as a suggested way to remember. It's important to remember that these snacks should have no nuts, including peanuts, peanut butter, or peanut oil. Please read labels carefully.

Some suggestions of cookies which have no nuts are nut-free varieties of Chips Ahoy, Oreos, Teddy Grahams, Vanilla Wafers, and Lorna Doone.

In May, we are asking families whose last names begin with the letters W to Z to bring juice and cookies.

Junior High: Our Junior High students this year have been studying Old Testament characters and stories as a part of their preparation for confirmation.

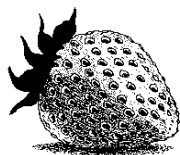
- A Tag Sale is planned for Saturday, May 31 beginning at 8 a.m. in front of the parsonage.
